Welcome to the Cub/Webelos Resident Camp at Camp Rockefeller! This program is an introduction to the outdoor program of the Boy Scouts of America and available to all Cubs and Webelos and their adult leaders or parents. They will spend three (3) nights and four (4) days enjoying the fun and excitement of a long-term camping experience. The Quapaw Area Council, BSA Resident Camp program is held at beautiful Camp Rockefeller and presented by certified staff. You will find both the camp and staff to be among the best in the nation. Ideas from camp leaders, staff members, and past campers have been incorporated to bring you new programs and a sense of spirit and belonging. Sign up early to reserve your "Home on the Range"! **Resident** Camp should be a vital part of your Pack's yearly program. Please consider the following information when planning your trip to Camp Rockefeller.

PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION CAREFULLY –

NOTE: Everyone who attends resident camp, boys, leaders, parents, and staff **MUST** submit a current medical form, signed by a physician and present a current copy or original of their **YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING CARD**. **NO** Exceptions.

Who Can Attend: Due to insurance issues, Resident Camp attendance is limited to registered Scouts, Registered Leaders, and parents who are registered members of the pack, district, or council. Siblings, (brothers and sisters) or unregistered adults may not attend. As noted, everyone must be Youth Protection Trained.

Leaders: Resident Camp requires a Scout-To-Adult ratio of no more than 5 to 1. For example, each leader may bring up to 5 boys to camp. Remember if you bring both Cubs and Webelos, you must have adult supervision for both groups.

Visitors: Everyone must check in/out with the Camp Director at the Administration Building when entering or leaving camp.

Identification: You will be given a colored identification arm band at check in. It is very important that you wear your arm band while you are at camp. Arm bands will be checked periodically. These bands not only identify your rank and campsite, but are your 'ticket' to all activities and meals!

Uniforms: All Scouts and Scouters should wear their field uniform (Class A) for the evening flag ceremony and evening meal. Activity uniforms (Scout t-shirt and shorts/pants) may be worn during the day.

Campsites: Each campsite contains a limited number of two-person tents, a fire ring and picnic table. These tents are on concrete pads and contain two cots. In order to accommodate everyone who wishes to attend resident camp, you are encouraged to bring your own tent if you have one.

Tent assignments: The Guide to Safe Scouting and Youth Protection Guidelines are used in making tent assignments. A Scout and his parent or legal guardian or two Scouts may share a tent. No Scout may share a tent with any adult other than his own parent or legal guardian. No exceptions.

Buddy System: Two or more Scouts and/or parents/leaders should be together wherever they are going. The Buddy System will be used throughout Resident Camp programming.

What to bring to Resident Camp

Automobiles are not allowed in the campsites. When you arrive, your gear will be transported from the bottom of the hill to your campsite. You will be instructed where to park your vehicle.

Programs: Resident Camp consists of two (2) separate programs. – Cub Scouts and Webelos Scouts. These programs will have very limited interaction. They will camp in different campsites, eat at different times and participate in different age-and –rank -appropriate programs. **If you plan to bring both Cubs and Webelos, you will need adult leadership for both groups.**

Cub Scout Program – this is for Cubs who will enter the second (2nd) and third (3rd) grades in the **fall** (Wolves and Bears) These boys and their leaders/parent will have assigned camps in Bear Creek, Turkey Flat and Deer Run and follow a different schedule.

Webelos Scout Program – this is for Cub Scouts who will enter the fourth (4th) and fifth (5th) grades in the **fall** (Webelos I and Webelos II). These boys and leader/parent will have assigned camps in North Point, Rabbit Run and Lake View and follow a different schedule.

Food: Nutritious, well prepared meals will be served in the camp dining hall. (As part of the Webelos Program, those Scouts will cook one or two meals in their campsite.) Your first meal will be dinner on Friday night. Snacks will be served during the night time events as well as periodically during daytime programs.
