Junior Leader Training Conference Facts

What is the Conference?

The junior leader training conference is a seven-day outdoor experience for boy leaders in support of the Scoutmaster's responsibility for the training of troop junior leaders. It is conducted by the council leadership training committee using an outline approved by the Boy Scout Division of the Boy Scouts of America.

What is Its Purpose?

Scouting recognizes that Scoutmasters have the responsibility of training their own junior leaders. The purpose of the junior leader training conference is not to assume that role, but to support it. The objectives of the conference are:

- To give participants the confidence and knowledge to run the troop program
- To give participants a basic knowledge of the eleven skills of leadership and help them relate these skills to their troop responsibilities
- To give participants the opportunity to share ideas and experiences with Scouts from other troops
- To create an atmosphere where Scouts will experience Scouting at its best
- To enhance the relationship between the participant and his Scoutmaster
- To have fun

Who May Attend?

Each conference participant must be a First Class Scout, 13 years old, and currently filling a leadership position in the troop as senior patrol leader or assistant senior patrol leader, or likely to assume one of these positions soon.

Is the Home Scoutmaster Involved?

The conference is intended to strengthen the relationship between the junior leader and his Scoutmaster. Scoutmasters must attend a special orientation session on the eleven skills of leadership. This is not required if the Scoutmaster has Wood Badge training.

What's the Date?

The junior leader training conference will open on Sunday, July 18, 2004 and conclude on Saturday, July 24. Participants should plan to arrive between 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. on opening day. Scouts will be ready to depart at 11:30 a.m. on the final day after the closing ceremony.

What's the Location?

The conference will be held at Blass Scout Reservation.

What's the Cost?

The cost for the conference is \$160. This includes all food, camping equipment, and training materials. A deposit of \$30 per Scout should accompany the troop's reservation, with the balance of \$130 per Scout remitted not later than May 14, 2004. After May 14, the conference cost will go up to \$175.

Is Any Special Equipment Needed?

An equipment list will be sent to each participant as soon as the troop's reservation is received. Most Scouts participating in an active troop outdoor program should have the necessary equipment. There are no special uniform requirements however each participant should see that badges and insignia are properly placed and that the uniform is worn correctly.

Registered Venturers, Boy Scouts, Explorers and leaders age 14 (and completed the eighth grade) through adult are invited to participate in Emergency First Aid/FIRST RESPONDER Training sponsored by the Quapaw Area Council Venturing Committee.

Participants will receive training at Blass Scout Reservation from Brit Ball, a licensed Emergency Medical Technician, in this course being offered in conjunction with the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences. The course will include 45 hours of training and a skills test and written test. [More details will soon be available at quapawbsa.org.] [This training will satisfy the Ranger Award First Aid Elective Requirement No. 2 for a "45-hour emergency response course plus the American Red Cross's **When Help is Delayed** module or equivalent course".]

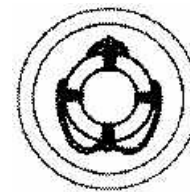

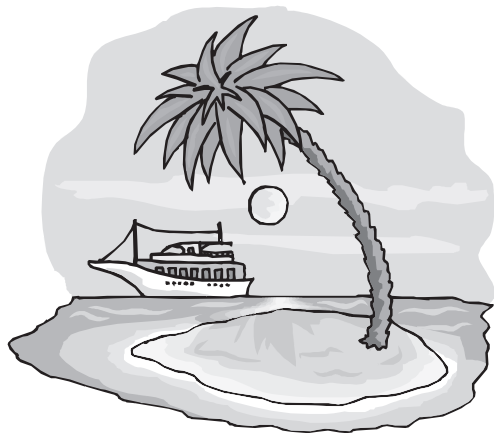
The 38th National Invitational Venturing White River Canoe Race, sponsored by the Quapaw Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America, will be held July 28-31, 2004. The three-day, 118.5-mile event begins below Bull Shoals Dam near Flippin, Arkansas and concludes at Batesville, Arkansas. The three race segments include 43.5 miles to Norfolk on July 29, 35 miles from Norfolk to Sylamore Creek on July 30, and 40 miles (and portaging around two dams) on July 31. Camping is available at Bull Shoals Dam, Norfolk Dam/Quarry Park, Sylamore Creek, Blanchard Springs and Gunner Pool Camp Grounds.
